Where to Stay

Ace Hotel Portland, 1022 S.W. Stark St., 228-2277; acehotel.com: A bohemian paradise of quirky fixtures, plank floors, and exuberant edginess.

Hotel Lucia, 400 S.W. Broadway, 225-1717; hotellucia.com: Hip urban interiors hung with stellar photography by Pulitzer Prize winner David Hume Kennerly explain why this 127-room hotel is a favorite with aesthetes.

Hotel deLuxe, 729 S.W. 15th Ave., 219-2094; hoteldeluxeportland.com: An homage to Hollywood glamour, with framed film stills and celebrity portraits; sip a cocktail in the Driftwood Room, the swank lounge downstairs.

Hotel Monaco Portland, 506 S.W. Washington St., 222-0001; monacoportland.com: Built in 1912 as a grand department store, this 221-room spot got a face-lift from designer Cheryl Rowley, who infused it with Anglo-Chinois ambience.

Jupiter Hotel, 800 E. Burnside St., 230-9200; jupiterhotel.com: A sexy destination pulsing with energy, thanks to spare, slinky rooms, a courtyard, and a prime perch overlooking music club Doug Fir.

McMenamins Kennedy School, 5736 N.E. 33rd Ave., 249-3983; mcmenamins.com: A 1915 villa-style elementary school turned into a 35-room hotel, featuring a restaurant, bars, a movie theater, brewery, soaking pool, funky murals, and vintage chalkboards.
